Refugee background means people who have had to leave their country because

- something bad has happened to them
- something bad might happen to them.



Services in north Melbourne areas



The National Disability Insurance Scheme has changed how health and disability services work.

More people with disability who have refugee backgrounds have come to north Melbourne areas since 2012.



People with disability who have refugee backgrounds find it hard to get services in north Melbourne areas.

What are the problems?

People with disability who have refugee backgrounds may find it hard to



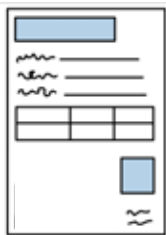
- understand how services work



- go to doctor visits



- talk to doctors or nurses



- get reports about their disability



- get support services when needed.

Some people who have refugee backgrounds have a disability we do **not** understand.



Some people with disability who have refugee backgrounds do **not** have the aids they need. For example, a walking aid.

Settlement problems

It is hard to **settle** in a new country.

Settle means to be part of a new community.

For example



- learn a new language



- find a house



- use public transport



- get education



- get a job

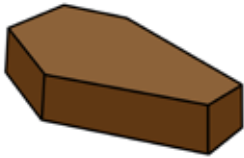


- get help from government services.

- seen people get hurt



- seen people die.



These people need more help to settle.

What needs to happen?

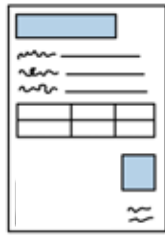


The report has information about how to make services better for people with disability who have refugee backgrounds.
